Identifying STAKEHOLDERS/Locating RELEVANT Sources:

Stakeholder: (n). a person, group, or organization that has interest or concern in a particular matter or issue; has something at stake, or at risk, if the issue works in their favor or not.

Take a look at your research topic/question and ask yourself, **WHO** are the voices worth listening to in this argument/debate? Who are the **experts** that know about it? Whose point of view **matters** in determining the answer to the question?
